NOMINATION FOR THE POSITION OF PRESIDENT (ONE POSITION)

Stephanie Booker - Friends of Aranda Bushland

My name is Stephanie Booker and this is a short statement in support of my nomination on the board of the Conservation Council ACT Region.

I moved to the ACT in 2018 to take up the role as CEO and Principal Lawyer of the Environmental Defenders Office in the ACT. During this time, I provided legal advice, legal information and community information to individuals and communities in the ACT on environment and planning issues. I grew to understand, not only the nature of the environment and environmental issues here in the ACT, but the social and political landscape in which environment and planning advisor, and provided policy advice on new planning law reforms, in addition to policy advice on other environmental laws and issues. Through this role I learnt how laws are created, negotiated and passed. I am a regular contributor to the Local Government Law Journal, where I write on ACT-related local government issues.

I am a member of Friends of Aranda Bushland (and I have been on the Committee for more than two years). I am also a member of Friends of Grasslands.

I continue to have a passion for nature here in the ACT, and have volunteered for the Conservation Council in the past year.

That will give board members enough time to undertake the <u>care and diligence</u> that are needed to make decisions that are in the <u>best interests</u> of all of the Council's member groups. Presidents will no longer need to worry about whether they are pushing agendas unconstitutionally through board meetings, on unconstitutionally short notice.

I will be accountable, <u>ethical and transparent</u> in <u>supporting member group involvement</u> in Council decision-making. In accordance with our constitution, and with the Associations Incorporation Act and its <u>Model Rules</u>, I will inform member groups of board meeting agendas, and ensure that Council <u>records and other documents are available for inspection</u> by nominated member group representatives <u>free of charge at a place in the ACT at a reasonable time</u>.

I am an environmentalist and sustainability professional who is seeking to increase my impact in addressing climate and biodiversity related issues given the crises we are facing. As a member of the board, I would contribute the following expertise:

Governance – Graduate, Australian Institute of Company Directors' (AICD) Company Directors course. I have served as a board member at Garran Primary School and was

founding convenor of Garran Residents Association. My current role is Associate Director, Sustainability at ANU, where I lead the University's operational environmental sustainability program. As part of this, I am integrating climate risk into the University's governance structure and risk management framework. I also co-chair an Australian Campuses Towards Sustainability working group developing climate scenarios for the tertiary education sector and will chair the Group of Eight Universities Sustainability Forum from 2025.

Research, policy and community engagement on climate change – Nine years' experience working with researchers, policy makers and the community on climate and energy related issues at ANU, including managing the ANU Institute for Climate, Energy & Disaster Solutions (ICEDS).

Sustainable development – Master of Environmental Management from UNSW. Strategic thinking and planning – I lead strategic planning on ANU decarbonisation and won an Outstanding Leadership leadership award in 2020 for this work.

I will bring to the board my six years of experience on the Conservation Council's board, plus my experience on the committees of Pedal Power, Living Streets Canberra, the ACT Branch of the Solar Energy Society, the North Canberra Community Council and the Downer Community Association.

Unlike any current board member I will ensure that the board is accountable for acting <u>ethically</u>, <u>transparently</u> and <u>constitutionally</u>. I will ensure that board members are given 48 hours to consider matters that are not urgent.

As a board member I will not allow my authority to be used for unethical actions, such as expelling people from Council Working groups because of their views, and banning them from the Council's office. Nor will I allow my authority to be used in applications for court orders to prohibit people from contacting the Council and from writing about the Council in the media.

I will ask the board to grant amnesties to board members who since 2016 have breached rule 19 of the constitution.

I will help the board to draft a new constitution for the 21st century, based on the <u>Model Rules</u> of the <u>Associations Incorporation Act</u>.
