

Our Future, Our Environment How do the parties rate on environment issues October 2012

The Conservation Council ACT Region has been protecting the environmental interests of Canberra and the surrounding region since 1979.

There is broad and enduring public support for action to protect the environment. Research consistently demonstrates that the public considers protecting the environment and proactive managing of natural resources should be a priority for the ACT Government.

Our unique environment underpins the social and economic fabric of the ACT. Our vision is for the highest quality environment for the Australian Capital Territory Region. We support a compact, ecologically sustainable, liveable and socially inclusive Canberra which embodies the principles of carbon neutrality and zero waste.

We sent the three major parties sixteen key measures on biodiversity, climate change, planning, transport, water, waste and sustainability to provide solutions to the challenges Canberra is facing now and into the future.

We received detailed responses from the Australian Labor Party and the ACT Greens and no response from the Canberra Liberals. Our scores are based on responses from the parties and other published documents. Against the sixteen measures for a total of 100 points we rated the parties as:

A highlight of the election policies is the plans put forward by the ALP and the ACT Greens on how to deliver our climate change target of 40% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2020. Both the ALP and Greens support a 90% renewable energy target by 2020. The Canberra Liberals have not outlined any target on climate change or any measures to reduce emissions; this is a very serious omission, particularly as at the last election the Liberals had a strong commitment to a 30% reduction in emissions.

Another key issue is the commitment of both the Liberals and the Greens to establish a single Biodiversity Conservation Service which undertakes and integrates policy, planning, research and management of ACT biodiversity.

The tripartisan support for considering a new Nature Conservation Act early in the next term of the Assembly is very welcome.
